WORD ABOUT TELESCOPES

About the year 1608, or so the story runs, a spectacle-maker living in a small dutch village had his small granddaughter visiting him. One day with a box of discarded optical lenses, he held two of them up, one several inches behind the other and in direct line with the steeple of the village church. Suddenly she cried out "Grandpa, come quick, the church steeple has come near." He was so startled that he dropped the lenses, and was shown how to hold them in different colours to focus on one spot, thus the image was blurred. The only way to overcome this, was to make the object glass of three lenses, each with its peculiar quality and cement them firmly together.

Many people have only a blurred "image" of what God is like, because somehow they have never really seen Him clearly. No man can "see" God as he is, until today we have a telescope that is almost perfect. During the years of experimentation a number of important factors came to light. In order that the telescope would give a clear, sharp image, each lens had to be free from strain within itself. One flaw, one streak of clouded glass, and the image was spoiled. Moreover, the telescope was useless if made out of a single lens, it required at least two lenses. The first, the object glass, second lens, magnified the image and sent the result to the eye. Most modern telescopes have more than two lenses. However, it was discovered that every lens suffers from a defect, which prevents it from bringing light in different colours to focus on one spot, thus the image was blurred. The only way to overcome this, was to make the object glass of three lenses, each with its peculiar quality and cement them firmly together.

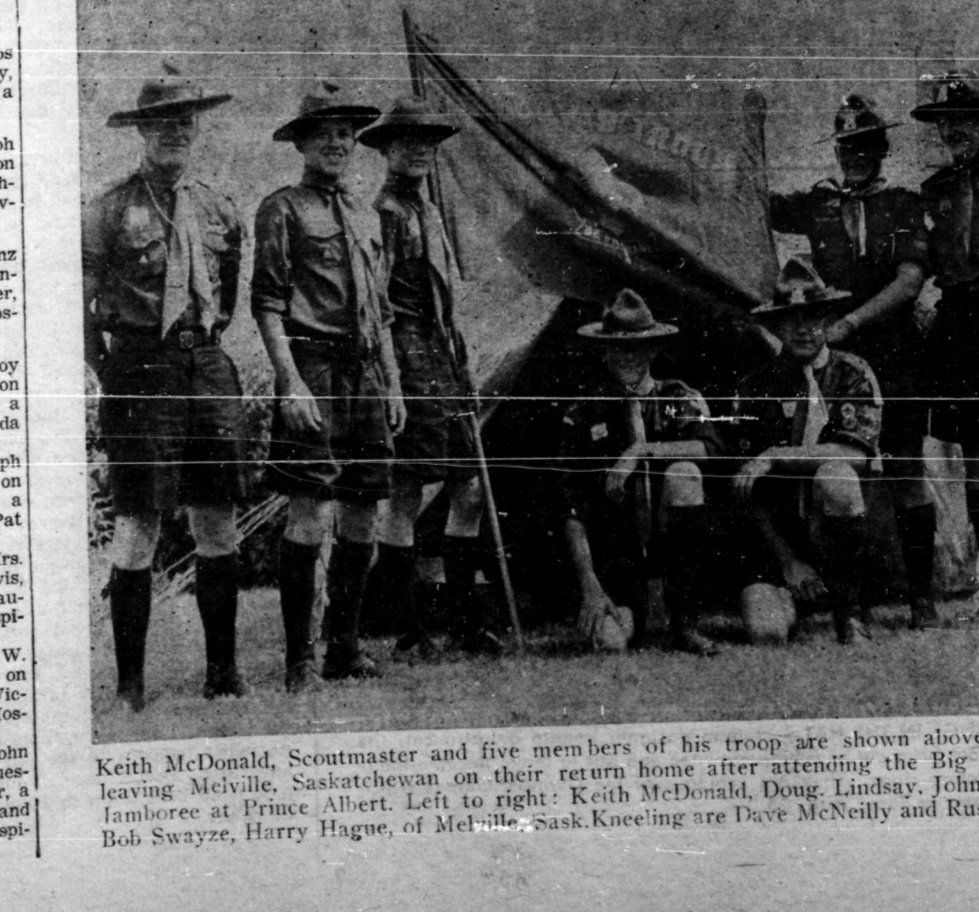
