THIS PAST WEEK END my travels took me to Hakone, a district between Mt. Fuji facts about Japanese customs on the back of the menus. These became so popular that he had menus. and the Izu Peninsula. The express train from Tokyo travels one and one-half hours to this popular resort area with breathtaking scenery, hot springs and cool climate. Our home for the week end was the Fujiya Hotel in Miyanoshita. The Fujiya is 1,377 feet above sea level and is nestled among the mountains in a very rural and well-wooded area. Although the hotel is Western style, the architecture is typically

The hotel itself is very luxurious but the prices are very cheap in comparison to prices at home. It offers such activities as swimming, ping-pong, tennis, billiards, hiking, yachting, climbing, golfing and tea ceremonies. The hotel is surrounded by gardens and greenhouses, streams and falls. Within the hotel there is the Flower Palace which consists of forty-three rooms each artistically decorated with the flower after which the room is named. The main dining room is panelled in wood and the ceiling is painted with flowers and birds from the Hakone area. There is a room filled with pictures of distinguished people who have stayed at the hotel and another room containing beautiful hand-carved carvings. There are numerous baths both private and public with such names as the Dream Pool, the Mermaid Bath, the Roman Aquarium Bath and the Eternal Youth Bath. Each bath is supplied with natural hot

spring water. Since our purpose in visiting this hotel was o get away from the noise, heat and crowds of Tokyo our activities were rather few but in the two days I experienced many new aspects of Japanese living. One of the most interesting persons I met was the author of "We Japanese". He makes his home at the Fujiya and spends the entire day talking to visitors and selling this book which gives you a broader insight into the customs and culture of Japan. It seems that the

With all the Japanese art we have purchased we plan to have at least one Japanese room in our homes when we return to Canada. Do hope that you will all be able to visit me one day to see the various things that you pick up

as you travel throughout Japan.
