BISHOP OF NIAGARA ISSUES LETTER ON SUNDAY OBSERVANCE

The following letter was read to congregations of the Anglican Diocese of Niagara on Sunday last. My Dear Friends:

Here are a few thoughts I would like to share regarding our use of Sunday. It is important that we should think seriously about this subject at a time when plebiscites are being held in certain areas on the question of Sunday sports and Sunday movies. We are really being asked whether we are in favour of a Sunday "different" to the other days of the week, or whether we want to see it as another "commercialized" day.

It is unfortunate that in this tremendously important question, the Church has often been placed in a negative position and accused of taking a negative stand. We are anxious that our people should consider this a positive way of looking at Sunday and to be and to take their stand on that.

Christianity, custom and law have generally regarded Sunday as:

(1) A day of worship. With a multitude of general necessities occupying the minds of people from Monday to Saturday, it is more and more essential that one day should be set apart when people can come together as congregations to worship their Creator, and to consider the great things of the spirit. To realize, in short, that they are not only creatures of time, but of eternity; that they possess not only a mortal body, but an immortal soul.

(2) A day for the family to be together in a very special way. A commercialized Sunday makes family life more difficult in every way. Anything that encourages members of the family to live their lives apart from the family weakens the basic unit of our society, and the national life of our country.

(3) A day for the speed of life seems to quicken as year succeeds year and with this increasing speed, it is more than necessary that we guard one day in seven as a time when people can really rest, and re-create their bodies and spirits. The world in which we live today demands men and women of the dependable character if we are to meet and overcome the many temptations that face us. We must stress the deepest concerns of our life and our living.

(4) A day which should be, as far as possible, free from ordinary week day work. It is not just enough to give one member of the family a five day and another member a different day. It is important that the whole family should be together, free from the tensions and pressures of the other days of the week.

In considering these matters, we must remind ourselves that we have a divine example to follow. We can never forget that the Creator Himself "rested" in a mysterious way from all the work which He had made.

Above all, I hope that our Christian people will realize that the Church takes a positive attitude towards Sunday. The Church is not against recreational activities, but the Church is FOR Sunday. What needs to be

seriously and earnestly considered is the kind of day Sunday will become if far as Sunday is concerned. Then we shall have just another day and not a different day.

My best wishes and my blessing to you all.
