WALPOLE TOWNSHIP NOMINATION MEETING (continued from page one) cluded Boston, Beaton and Hartford. Craig Werner, a nominee, was of the opinion that the time was not ripe for this innovation. Roy Craddock, also nominated, felt that the school should be operated as cheaply or even more so than the little red school house, but took exception to the high rate of absenteeism. He pointed out that these absenteeism must be paid back, capital as well as the high rate of absenteeism. Ralph Gowen, as a proponent of Centralization, spoke of the proposed modernization of the Selkirk school giving figures to show that the architectural plan called for the maximum cost of \$33,000, needed to make the building an up to the minute six room unit eligible to receive the Departmental grant. He stressed the fact that teachers - a scarce commodity - would not teach in a one-room school handling all grades in hiring for such a school if it had been and would be increasingly necessary to escape the bottom of the barrel to obtain staff.

Reporting From the Far East TOKYO TOWER IF YOU were to visit Tokyo as a tourist, one of the first places you would be told to see is Tokyo Tower. Up until recently it served only as a landmark for me. However after my first visit I feel you might also be interested in this structure. The tower itself is similar in construction to the Eiffel Tower in Paris. This tower is self-supporting and reaches a height of 333 meters. Too it can boast the fact that it is taller than the Eiffel Tower - Tokyo Tower is the highest in the world. The tower was constructed in December 1958 to centralize the antennas of six television stations and to establish television transmitting facilities, collectively and economically. Each transmitter in the Tower has a power output of 50 kilowatts with a range of 100 kilometers radius. The total cost of construction was \$7,800,000 and 220,000 workers were employed to complete the tower over a period of one and a half years. Approximately 4,000 tons of steel were used. It was completed entirely by Japanese.
