

OBITUARY

DR. F. L. WILLIAMSON

A Hamilton dentist for the past fifty-seven years, Dr. Frederick L. Williamson died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton on Tuesday, December 13th, 1960. He was Seventy-eight.

Born at Jarvis, Ontario, Dr. Williamson's home was on Fifth Avenue, Hamilton, at the time of his death. He was a past president and honorary life member of the Ontario Dental Association; past president of the Hamilton Dental Association; and Fellow of the American College of Dentists. He was a member of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church.

An ardent golfer, he won the Hamilton district golf championship in 1927.

Dr. Williamson is survived by his wife, the former Jean M. Murray; two daughters, Mrs. J. H. (Jane) Brown and Mrs. Alex. Z. (Annie) Beasley, of Hamilton; two brothers, Albert of Jarvis and Murray of Dundas; and seven grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Friday, December 16th at 2 P.M. from the Dwyer Funeral Home, Hamilton, with burial in Woodland Cemetery.

CHRISTMAS IN JAPAN

MANY OF YOU are probably wondering when Christmas in Japan, although it is two weeks before December 25, you can pretty well ascertain what Christmas will mean and be like by observing and hearing what is about you.

For the most part, the Japanese people are not Christians but rather Buddhist. For this reason Christmas means nothing to many of them. However with the rapid westernization of Tokyo you see many of the ideas of Christmas being adopted by the merchants, newspapers, commercial in that the merchants, newspapers, radio and T.V. cater to the foreigners. The streets and department stores are decorated with trees, tinsel and bells but nowhere do you see anything concerning the birth of Christ. The principal songs you hear are not carols but rather "Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer" or "Winter Wonderland." So the only place you can find the true meaning is in the Church, in youth homes or with Christian friends. Some of the Christmas trees you see are made of aluminum and paper trees. The decorations are really very beautiful and different from what we know. The Christmas balls that we hang on our trees are covered in various shades of silk thread and the tiny lights blink off and on in various colours. Paper lanterns are made in the shapes of large snowmen or Santa Claus and this year one of the big items is the red and white striped Santa Claus hat. With all the Christmas decorations, you see the Japanese New Year decorations which are equally beautiful and made in vivid shades of paper and ribbon.

The weather here is not at all similar to the weather we know at Christmas. Although the temperature falls to near freezing, the sun is always shining and the days are clear. Snow has fallen once or twice in the early months of the new year but it is rapidly melted by the sunshine. North of here in the mountainous regions you can find snow but only occasionally does Tokyo have a white Christmas.

As far away as Japan is from Canada, the same feeling of goodwill and peace exists here as it does in Canada. Here you can observe how various Christian races remember the birth of Christ. Nearly everyone will have a Christmas tree and will attend the Church of his choice on Christmas Day. Since it is such a universal belief the only difference will be that the Japanese will celebrate a day earlier than you, because of the international difference, will eat different food, wear different clothes and praise God in a foreign language.
