JAPANESE NEW YEAR

WHILE FOREIGNERS from the Western world here are busily making preparations for Christmas, the people of Japan are looking toward their greatest holiday which is the New Year Festivals. From January 1st to January 3rd business is stopped, and the people are getting together with friends and relatives.

Everywhere there will be automobiles filled with people going to visit theatres, parks, temples, shrines and banquets. All hard feelings are forgotten and acquaintances. Since this is such a universal custom it is impossible to receive every guest so a box is placed at the entrance of many houses where calling cards may be dropped.

At New Year's, many cards with season's greetings are sent by mail and presents are given. Work is taboo and a happy spirit prevails everywhere. The interesting part in the sending of cards is that it is considered unlucky for a Japanese to receive a New Year's card before January 1st. Considering the fact that in Tokyo alone about ten million people with mail are served, how backlogged post offices become with mail at this season. Keeping to their duty on January 1st and since this is a ceremonial drink called with the food, a ceremonial drink flavoured with spices and herbs to prevent sickness in the New Year. Mochi, a kind of rice-paste, made into round and square cakes of different sizes eaten throughout the holidays.
