CANON SHIRTS OF CAYUGA ADDRESSES HALDIMAND TEACHERS' CONVENTION

(Intended for a previous issue. The following is a paper presented to the Haldimand Teachers' Conference at Cayuga, October 9th, 1959 by Canon Shiras of Cayuga Anglican Church.)

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen, Fellow-workers in the noble, necessary but exacting Teaching Profession.

I am honoured in being asked to take some small part in your educational conference and would like to express to you my appreciation of, and thanks for, your kind invitation. It is two things in your programme appeal to me very much: (1) The use of the proper title for periods such as "Devotional Period" in a conference, and (2) The use of the word "Devotional" originally meant "Set aside for that in our school work which is devoted to the study of the Bible and the knowledge of God. You know how pitifully small that is in our schools and how inadequately it is directed and used in many of our schools.

(2) Then in the second place your theme of "Methodology" is most encouraging. I am particularly interested in better methods of presenting the subject matter, because he remembers how bewildered he was when he first entered a classroom. He learns not to worry when he loses an order, because experience has shown that always gives him the best, his average will break a pretty well. He learns that no man ever got to first base, and that he can only through co-operative effort that we move on to better things. He learns that bosses are no monsters trying to get the last ounce of work out of him for the last amount of

pay, but that they are usually pretty good fellows who have succeeded hard work and who want to do the right thing. He learns that folks are not any harder to get along with in one place than another, and that getting along depends about ninety-eight per cent on his own behaviour.
