### Hagersville Legion to Give Prizes For Public Speaking

Once again the Hagersville Legion is proud to announce its Annual Public Speaking Contest. Indications are that it will be even a lesser contest than last year. It will take place on Wednesday, January 27th, in the Hagersville High School Gymnasium at 8 P.M. There are nineteen schools in the district who are eligible to send contestants.

### ON THE FARM FRONT

Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

The argument is still going on regarding the use of ordinary methods of preparing feed for livestock. It is still being argued that there are some advantages to pelleting but the cost of preparing still is the limiting factor. Naturally pelleted feed requires less storage and also less handling and it has been pointed out that still require some coarse roughage to remain normal. Except under special circumstances it might be wise to stick with the ordinary methods of preparing feedstuffs.

Recent information issued by the Health of Animals Division of the Canada Department of Agriculture is to the effect that a number of cases of rabies reported in Canada from April 1, 1959 to the middle of December, 1959 took a 75 per cent drop from the same period in 1958. This has been described as being "not nearly as grave". Ontario remained in the center of rabies activity. The significant decline was in the number of foxes infected. While the danger would seem to be much less there is still need for farm people to be on the watch and to report any suspicious cases.

Creamery butter production in the various areas of Ontario during the last year, and the production of eggs during the present quarter, is being watched by the Agricultural Stabilization Board and if necessary interim payments will be made to the end of this quarter. This Board covers only those eggs that have been marketed during the quarter.

- (3) Progressive Labour. And these two parties and unions have a heavy responsibility with regard to today's educational problems.
- (4) The field of science.
- (5) Representatives of the Protestant faith.

An educational servant from our Provincial Education body. And now let us see how this body would act in another way? They would decide what students should continue in public schools. They would act as teacher and principal in the field of science. They would act as a "Provincial Education Body" at all education problems, teacher, student, parent, curriculum, curriculum type of school, and all problems relating to education and more particularly would they bring their educational aims into line with today's needs and requirements, which after all, is the greatest desire of our day.
