Over one hundred and fifty adults received their first dose of Poliovirus Vaccine, and twenty-seven infants received their first dose of Quadruple Vaccine combined Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whooping Cough and Poliovirus (DTP) at the Jarvis Clinic.

Over one hundred and fifty adults received their first dose of Poliovirus Vaccine, and twenty-seven infants received their first dose of Quadruple Vaccine combined Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whooping Cough and Poliovirus (DTP) at the Jarvis Clinic.

RENEWING THE FAMILY

Our families, so it is society, with a decline in parental responsibility and a loosening of the family ties, are being torn apart. The intimacy of 'togetherness' has been replaced by a serious blow. Talking with men and women for whom life and its relationships have become a problem, often confirms that the roots of their trouble lie to be found in unsatisfactory or unwholesome family experiences.

It is not a time to sentimentalize the family, but rather to consider seriously what can be done to stop the disintegration of our homes through the inroads of modern culture. It would be well for us, first of all, to recall that family life is a divine institution, that from the dawn of creation man has been set on a path which is only really a path to the Divine within our family life. The institution of marriage has been ordained 'of God as a foundation and bond of family life, the means by which the human race has been propagated and cared for. The family is the centre of the social order, the place where lives are shaped, controlled, directed that ultimately they may be on their highest fulfillment. With the passage of the years, the important parental functions have been delegated to outside agencies. In many instances, the family has become the sole agent of socialization and moral training has been shifted to the church and its related organizations. Youth clubs and other social groups provide the recreational facilities. To a large degree, the family has become a place where parents have to have something of a return to 'evening school' in order to keep up with the times. All too frequently, merely the intercommunication between parents and children is broken.
