TENSION IN TOKYO

People's Council Against Revision of the Japan-U.S. Security Treaty last night decided to stage the biggest possible protest demonstration on the airfield that day.

It is hard to say at this point what will happen here or to assess the type of welcome Eisenhower will receive when he arrives Sunday, June 19.

Some Americans living here have run into trouble with the mob.

Tokyo International Airport will be closed from 1 A.M. Sunday, the day President Eisenhower arrives for his visit to Japan. A total of 27,000 policemen will be mobilized during his stay.

The strictest security precautions will be taken and an additional 15,000 man mobile force will be on alert at the general headquarters within the Metropolitan Police Department. Anyone who is caught on the airfield that day will be arrested if he doesn't have an official pass.

Personally, I admire President Eisenhower for going through with his plans to visit Japan. The Japanese government invited him in commemoration of 100 years of U.S.-Japanese relations and on their invitation he is coming. However, the strong Communist element here can do anything and the Japanese government is taking on a big responsibility in safeguarding him personally from violence.
