HANDBOOK GOING TO EVERY CANADIAN HOME

CLARIFIES TRUE CHOICE FOR FREE WORLD

TORONTO, March 7—In a nationwide distribution through the Post Office every home in Canada will receive a manifesto which is clarifying for hundreds of millions of people across the world the issues created by the cold war.

A handbook, "Ideology and Co-Existence," prepared by Moral Resistance, with this title, goes to 4,500,000 Canadian homes. Patriotic Canadians determined that Canada lay dormant to put the free world on the ideological offensive have taken this initiative.

Canadians will join the ranks of 18 million families throughout Europe who have already received "Ideology and Co-Existence" which expresses the ideology of the free world in clear terms and presents an appeal to every home in Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland, Holland and other nations of the free world.

In Switzerland, General Henri Guisan, wartime Commander-in-Chief of the Swiss Army, wrote in a foreword, "Our country follows a non-committal policy in international affairs. In the ideological struggle however, neutrality can be dangerous, for refusal to fight with the right side plays the role of the CIO in Cyprus former EOKA freedom fighters distributed the booklet by the German Foreign Office order of 1200 copies for its officials. WILL INSTAL NEW TELEPHONES
Telephone men will soon make their rounds of homes and offices in Jarvis installing new dial telephones in preparation for the introduction of dial service here in June.

The new telephones will be required when the Jarvis exchange is converted to dial operation. Until that time, telephone users wishing to place calls will simply remove the receiver and the operator will answer. The dial will not be used.

D. A. McArthur, Bell Telephone manager for this area, said the new telephones are being installed well ahead of time so that all will be ready when the change-over is made. Mr. McArthur said that Jarvis would be the first community in this part of Canada to use "All Number Calling" (A.N.C.) the telephone numbering system which, it was recently announced, will gradually be introduced throughout Canada and the United States.

With this type of numbering each telephone number consists of seven figures. All Jarvis telephone numbers will begin with a three-figure exchange code, 287, and this will be followed by four other figures. A typical Jarvis telephone number might be 287-1234.

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
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
