The federal government will make a deficiency payment of 21 cents per pound on wool marketed by farmers in 1959. Payment is calculated as the difference between the stabilizing price of 60 cents a pound and the average market price of 39 cents delivered at Toronto. The 1959 wool clip was heavy because of a late start and a half and six million pounds.

Canadian hog marketing continues at a high level, with last week's total of 141,860 bringing the total since January 1st close behind 1958.

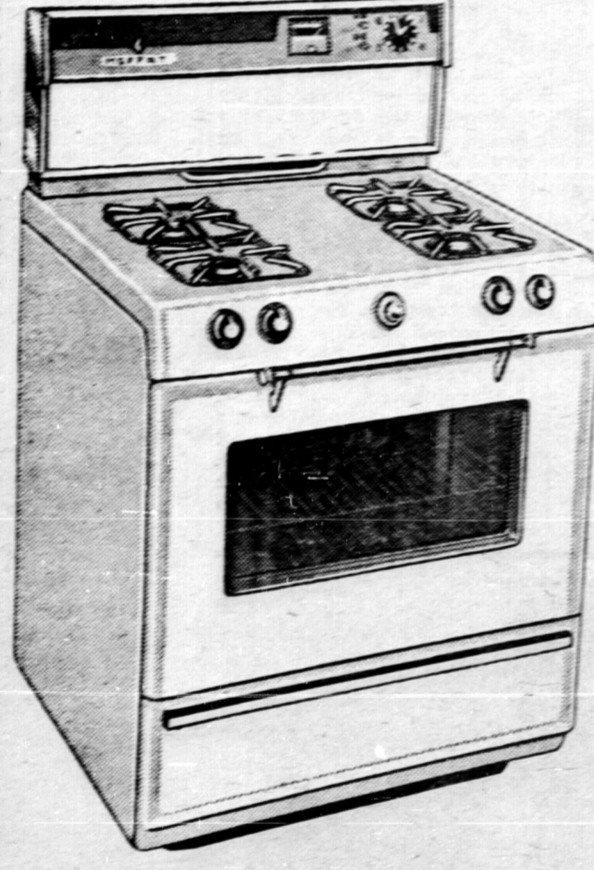

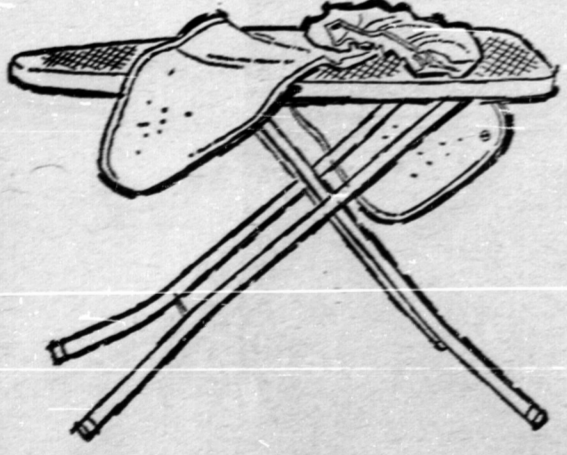

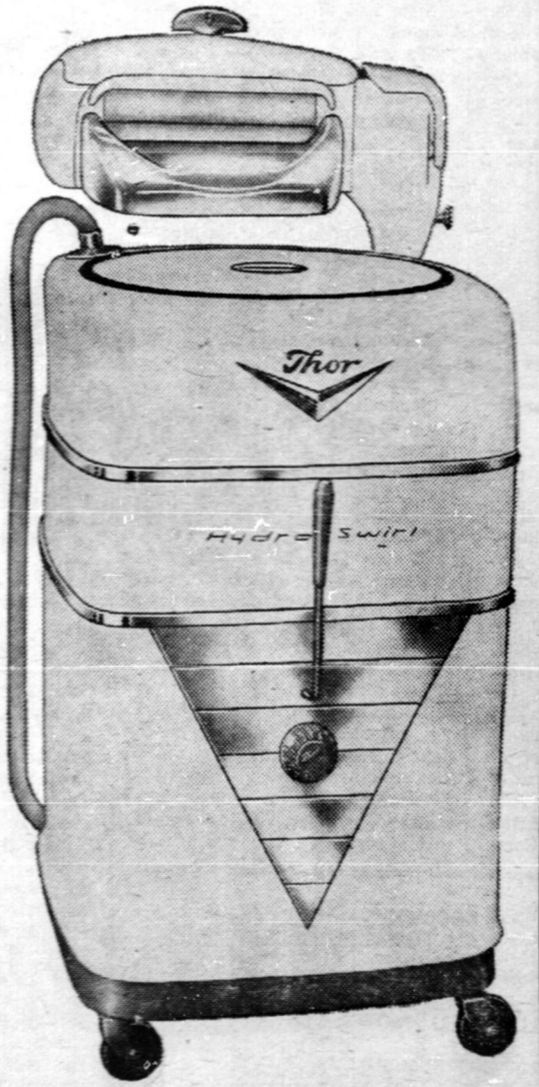

ARIO HOG PRICES

O.A.C. specialists recommend that brooder temperatures should be kept between 95 and 98 degrees F. Two inches from the floor or above the litter at the edge of the brooder for the first week the chicks are in.

If a man can save ten minutes a day through the use of a special machine and the hourly rate for wages is \$1.00 per hour he can afford to spend \$300.00 on the purchase of that piece of new equipment.

According to the preliminary estimate based on monthly reports it would now appear that Halldmand producers have marketed 40,522 hogs during 1959 which is an increase of 78.4 per cent over the figure for 1958.

There is still a tremendous loss every year through disease. This applies in all our livestock production. Especially is it true in the case of poultry. There is a great need for every producer to follow a program of good sanitation.

Thoroughly washing all equipment in the poultry house and keeping it clean will go a long way in the control and spread of the disease. It would be just common sense to completely disinfect after each use.

There seems to be a slight upsurge in the requests for information on farm accounts and this is all to the good. The Ontario Farm Account Book is still available and can be obtained from the office of Agricultural Reporting.
