Mr. Lawless was speaking in a pan discussion at the 22nd annual convention of the Public School Trustees' Association of Ontario in Brantford.

"Up to 1945, approximately 90 per cent of all graduates from teachers' colleges went to rural schools," he declared.

Since then the trend had changed, he pointed out, with 90 per cent now going to graded classrooms in urban centres.

"You know the calibre of the 10 per cent that are left," he added.

Where there were once 15 pupils in Grades 1 to 8 in a one-room school there were now 35,40 even 50 pupils. "It is an impossible task for a teacher to teach the curriculum we have today to 50 children in eight different grades."

Mr. Lawless urged that central schools be established within township school areas. These would combine the urban school system with the rural way of life, he said.

This system would allow teachers to specialize in particular subjects within grades.

In addition, central school systems offered rural municipalities up to seven per cent (plus another \$4 per pupil) in additional provincial grants. School Boards also receive a transportation grant, expenses and \$500 per school section toward the cost of a central school.
