**Reporting From the Far East**

**NATIONAL RAILWAY SYSTEM**  
 THE PRINCIPAL means of transportation in Japan is the railway. To some people this may mean "bad news" but to others it can be one of the country's main sources of amusement. In my case it is the latter and this week I would like to tell you about some of my experiences as a railway traveller.  
 There are two types of trains in Japan. One is the kyusa or steam train and the other, the densya or electric train. From past experience I would advise taking the densya, the reasons for which are quite simple. If you want to breathe as you go through tunnels and arrive only half black in color you will not go by steam train.  
 Railway stations in Japan are always crowded as most sane people prefer to go by railway rather than risking their lives on the highway. However the dangers of being trampled to death in the rush or being caught in closing doors may discourage the well-meaning traveller. The danger doesn't end in getting on and off the train either as you can be stepped on and feel yourself gasping for air as the crowds push in. This past week end I decided to get away from the home and crowds of Tokyo and to head for Karuzawa, a cool, quiet summer resort, on a third class train. I will say that Karuzawa lived up to my expectations but the trip there and back was beyond my expectations.  
 The train left Tokyo at 8:30 A.M. and it seems that the prudent travellers arrive an hour before departure to reserve a seat. As I sauntered in at 8:29 you can well imagine what faced me for three and one-half hours on two narrow cars on a narrow platform with one foot out the door and the other inside. Fortunately I still have that foot but there were times when it narrowly missed a mailbox or a warning signal pole. Needless to say as the doorman had to get off and on at every stop to let the men and women with their vegetables, rice-cakes, tools and children strapped to their backs. To add to the problem, the trains are never late and when that whistle blows you must have one foot aboard or you are a goner. Similarly you have to be on in a designated time or you travel on. Consequently people are throwing themselves and their luggage in and out of windows. The railway authorities have to live up to their reputation as Japan's trains are always prompt and on the nothing must, but their operation.
