

## Reporting From the Far East

NATIONAL RAILWAY SYSTEM

in Japan is the railway. To some people this y mean "bad news" but to others it can be ne of the country's main sources of amusen my case it is the latter and this week I would e to tell you about some of my experiences

s a railway traveller. There are two types of trains in Japan. One the kisya or steam train and the other, the nsya or electric train. From past experience would advise taking the densya, the reasons for which are quite simple. If you want to breathe as you go through tunnels and arrive only half black in color you will not go by steam

Railway stations in Japan are always crowded is most sane people prefer to go by railway rather than risking their lives on the highway lowever the dangers of being trampled to death n the rush or being caught in closing doors may courage the well-meaning traveller. anger doesn't end in getting on and off the train either as you can be stepped on and feel yourself gasping for air as the crowds push in. This past week end I decided to get away from the heat and crowds of Tokyo and to head for third class train. I will say that Karuizawa lived up to my expectations but the trip there and

There were six people sitting in my seat so you can picture the scene. Lying on the newspaper-covered floor beside me was a man whose stomach I had to straddle. Across the way a man proceeded to take off his trousers and shirt and sat very comfortably in his underwear. Ahead of me two men were sitting in their undershirts drinking a bottle of whiskey and beside me a woman was nursing her baby. To add to the confusion another man was eating a bowl of rice containing peas and whenever he came across a pea, he tossed it on the floor of the car. Think slipping on a pea would be worse than a banana peel. The floor was covered with bottles, empty cartons, spilled milk, soft drinks and all sorts of refuse by the time we reached Tokyo. The ventilation didn't improve as more people boarded at the various stops. It would be no exaggeration to say that there were eighty or more peo-

ple in that car. I don't suppose you run across such scenes each time you travel in Japan but I wouldn't have traded it for the plushest dome car in Canada. It wasn't at all luxurious, comfortable or relaxing but those three and one-half hours were amusing. Travelling this way you can go for miles for a very few dollars and in doing so can become acquainted with these delightful Japan-ese people. Although their ways are different, they are basically the same as we are. In being crowded together this way you make more friends than you ever could in a year in Canada. We shared the same funny experiences, laughed and joked together and looked out for one an other's comfort. As I got off the train I had a car of friends because the remaining travellers were all smiling, waving, throwing kisses and saying "Sayonara." We may never meet again but there will always be the next train passen-
