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WEEKLY EDITORS TO MEET IN VANCOUVER

More than 400 representatives of Canada are expected to attend the 41st annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association in Vancouver, September 12, 13 and 14.

Those of the conference is "Pacific 60" and delegates will examine the importance of trade with Pacific countries.

Among convention highlights will be a report on Russia by Dr. A.E. (Dai) Grauer, B.C. Electric president and University of British Columbia chancellor.

Presentation will be made during the convention of the 1960 Better Newspapers Awards, given annually by the C.W.N.A. in recognition of outstanding achievement. Included are awards for the best all-round paper, best editorial page and best front page in the various circulation groups.

Chairman of the sessions will be C.W.N.A. President Leslie E. Barber of the Chilliwack (B.C.) Progress Co. Hucker, of the Abbotsford (B.C.) News.
