## ELECTION BELLS ARE RINGING IN CONTESTS AT HAGERSVILLE

Mr. Roth stated that the nomination meeting this year was one of the best attended meetings in many years. He succeeded the late Wilfred McCarthy in that office. Clerk Art Ross announced on Tuesday night that three members of last year's council will be contesting the Reerevship. They are: Nick Easly, William Courtnage and Earl Huffman. There will be seven candidates for the four council seats, all new to the municipal field with exception of William Willis. Willis served on the council in 1959 and lost his seat in the election last year. He is back again in the field along with Robinson, Lon Willard, John McKellar, Kenneth Wilson and Philip McGraw. Retiring Reeve, George Beckett, was given an acclamation to the Hydro Commission for a two year term. He succeeds Norman Graham who retired this year after many years service. The other Hydro Commissioner is Roy Hewitt, who has one year still to serve of his two year term. Mr. Roth stated that the nomination meeting this year was one of the best attended meetings in many years and that this is the first election for Reeve in Hagersville in the past twenty years. Previous incumbents during that period were elected by acclamation. There are also five candidates running for the three seats on the school board. The three retiring trustees, Dr. V. Powell, Grant Kett and Fred G. Stewart are in the field along with Clayton Heaslip and Reg. McGrath.
