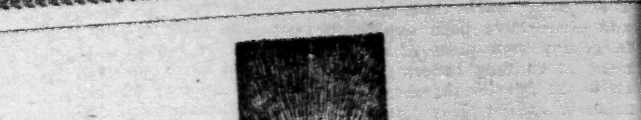

### LAUNCH MAJOR CAMPAIGN IN WEST HALDIMAND

The start of a major public subscription Campaign for the proposed West Haldimand Hospital has been announced by the Hospital Board.

With an objective of \$175,000 this is the largest fund raising project attempted in the area. The objective of the \$175,000 represents the difference between the provincial, Governmental and County Grants and the estimated cost of the 55 bed Hospital which is \$225,000.

The Campaign will take about three months to complete and the initial work of planning and organization is presently underway at the Campaign Headquarters which is located at 4½ Main Street, South Hagersville.

The West Haldimand Hospital will serve Caledonia, Cayuga, Selkirk, Fisherville, Hagersville and Jarvis and surrounding communities.
