Reporting From the Far East
A HOUSE PARTY

ON READING THE TITLE of this article, you are probably wondering what this could possibly involve. In Japan it can mean a case of frazzled nerves and a good all-round bad humour.
 When a couple decides to have a house party in Japan you can rest assured that their troubles will be many. First of all there will be the task of sending out invitations with an enclosed map indicating how the guest will find his destination. If the invitations are sent well in advance (about two weeks prior to the date) the guest may receive the notice but if the map is not written in Japanese there is no guarantee that he will appear at the party. Telephone invitations are worse because the directions may be to go to Yatsuya station, turn right at the bath house, turn left at the noodle shop, go to the nearest police box, go down the alley to the right and follow our name signs and arrows. It's very simple, but if you take a speeding taxi you miss all these landmarks and often spend a good hour in getting back to your own home. If you are the persistent type, you may arrive at the party as the last guests are leaving. As a matter of fact, you feel very proud of yourself if you ever do find the proposed place.
 Since many foreigners do not speak Japanese it is necessary for them to have a cook-maid to do their shopping and cooking. If the hostess is planning a dinner and has no time to consult with the maid before the preparation there is no guarantee what will be served. Most maids are very reliable but you often hear funny tales of what guests are served. One lady was having a group of dignitaries for dinner one night and the main course turned out to be a raw duck. Others have served such things as garlic wine and ice cream smothered in gravy. So in a West-

ern home, particularly one with a new cook, anything can happen. There is no need to say therefore that the hostess can be very nervous and frightened.
 Too, there is the problem of dress for the foreign woman in Japan. If she is going to a Japanese home, she knows there will be no central heating with the result that she wears her thickest and fullest skirt for floor sitting. She will wear extra sweaters and takes along a pair of floor. If she is invited to a Western home, she will wear her heaviest stockings and a cut-out sheath dress. In her purse will be a fan and a handkerchief to mop her brow for steam heat will mean just the opposite.
 If the party happens to be an embassy function, you can rest assured it will not be a relaxing evening especially if there are people from various countries represented. You may go headlong into an English conversation with an Asian only to find that he hasn't understood one word you have said. The majority of people can speak English but if not, you try to converse in your limited knowledge of another language. This in turn can be pretty silly because you begin to sound like a blubbery idiot. Too, you may say something that in Canadian humour is very amusing, only to be met with a straight face. So at times, it is best just to keep silent and hide in the corner.
 In sum, it all boils down to how patient and tolerant an individual you are. If you don't have these qualities, plus a good sense of humour and an ability to laugh at yourself living in a foreign country can be tiring and unrewarding. However I feel that these are things that make life interesting and if ever I stop laughing, this will be the time to leave the foreign atmosphere.
