DEATH OF A FARM FRONT
 Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer
 By Haldimand Harry
 The dairyman who needs cows to produce milk next summer early should make sure they are bred now within the next week or so. This one of the points to be watched in farm management. It is highly important that a carefully worked out breeding schedule be followed. It is to be a regular milk supply for the quota, everyone is aware of the necessity of maintaining it. One farmer recently reported that he might have to buy fresh cows in order to do just that.

DO NOT doubt milkling cows will have developed quite a winter coat by this time and this with winter stable conditions creates a real problem in the production of clean milk. For that reason it is recommended that the milking herd should be clipped to save time and effort each time the cow is milked. The tailhead and tail should be clipped and the switch suit from saving had a test made of your soil. The only way to be sure of the analysis and amount to apply is to use a soil test. Otherwise you may be applying the wrong analysis and either too much or too little in either case. Do you know how to proceed to be sure to contact your agricultural representative's office where you can obtain full information along with sample boxes and you can even have a soil sampling tube at a subsidized price that will assist in taking the sample.

Remember, when a team sees all the horsepower you had to plow the back forty? Slow down, you've compared your use now. Safer, too. Modern power machinery can't think. While old dobbin would stop at the end of the furrow, if you didn't pull on the line, a tractor goes right on. Farmers here have been killed because they forgot that you have to drive every foot of the way.
