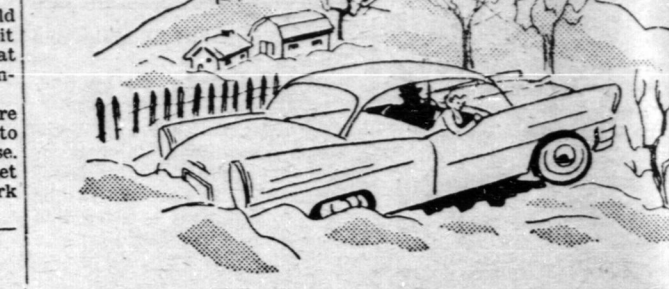

of January. Eggs set for chicken broilers so fast this year are up about 78 per cent to 3 per cent in 1960 as compared with the same time last year.

The consumption of red meat in Canada has increased by a little over two per cent in 1960 as compared with the same time in 1959 but during the same time the cattle population which this year will be held at Hays Sales Arena, north of Oakville on Tuesday, March 14th.

From an increase in beef cow numbers in the West with a larger carry-over of steers and calves on feed, however, stocks of meat in storage on January 1st of this year were down by forty-two per cent over seven years ago.

It has been pointed out that in the 1956 Census, there was 21 per cent of the Canadian farms that produced less than \$1,200 worth of produce annually. It is still further reported that 120,242 of the total of 575,015 farms fall into this category. This is one reason why the steady market in all the red meats at the present time.

Turkey breeders in Western Canada have set almost three times as many eggs for hatching purposes already this season as compared with the same time last year. It would appear as though they feel this is one outlet for some of the surplus grain which they have on their hands.

It is a well known fact that mature corn makes better feed and there is always less discount for high moisture when the crop is well matured.

Making "hay in a day" is quite possible with the use of a hay conditioner, according to the experts. In order to do this it is necessary to have the best possible drying weather and of course to take full advantage of it by cutting the hay early in the morning. In general, it can be stated that the use of a hay conditioner will cut the drying or curing time in half. This is certainly important when the weather is tricky.
