Christian Viewpoint

 BUILDING BEYOND OURSELVES

In answer to the question, "What in your opinion is the greatest obstacle between us and the building of a better world peace?" Sir Alfred Zimmerman, the British author of an international affairs, replied: "The small-scale individual." In his opinion, the greatest need is to build beyond himself, beyond the narrow interests of his own affairs, and commit himself to the larger good. "Too many are like the old man who prayed: 'Lord bless me and my wife My son John and his wife My daughter and her husband My four, and no more.'"

It is this "limited concern that hinders the way of world peace and brotherhood among men, and social justice, for it is in contradiction to the command of God that we should love our neighbour as ourselves."

There lives in the islands north of us, a race of people known as the Inuit, who are the descendants of an original Inuit race that once held on to a precarious existence, which borders on extinction because they have never learned to organize any larger unit to help themselves. "One way to become excited physically and spiritually is to only for oneself."

Some time ago there was no one beyond the boundaries of his own locale, but today we live in a world that grows ever smaller, making it impossible to live in isolation because we are dependent upon others. Walter Scott has said: "The race of mankind would perish did he cease to aid each other." "No one can exist without mutual help. All therefore that need help have a right to ask it from their fellows, and no one who has the power of granting it, can refuse it without guilt." We are all bound up in the same bundle of life, where racial prejudice, political arrogance and economic greed threaten to destroy our very being. We must learn to build beyond ourselves or perish.

Jesus through His life and ministry has torn down the dividing prejudices of nationality and teaches universal love, without distinction of race, color or rank. A man's neighbour is everyone that needs help. "Jesus taught the story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10) that we might understand our duty. The real answer to our need is the cross, for it is the cross that erases self to save others. Little Tommy, aged five, was looking at a cross, and not understanding its meaning, said, "O yes, I see, 'I was for Tommy.'"

It will be years before Tommy is capable of understanding the real meaning of the cross, but the symbol that it represents, "I crossed out my own locale, but today we live in a world that grows ever smaller, making it impossible to live in isolation because we are dependent upon others. Walter Scott has said: "The race of mankind would perish did he cease to aid each other." "No one can exist without mutual help. All therefore that need help have a right to ask it from their fellows, and no one who has the power of granting it, can refuse it without guilt." We are all bound up in the same bundle of life, where racial prejudice, political arrogance and economic greed threaten to destroy our very being. We must learn to build beyond ourselves or perish.

Main opponent to the bill was the CCF who charged it would turn over control of a Canadian utility to a United States company. Some 68 per cent of the shares of the company would be owned by Continental Oil Company of Houston, Tex.

"This is another instance of a great natural resource being controlled in its transportation by a United States company," said CCF Leader Argue.

The company proposes to transport liquid petroleum products from Alberta to the international boundary over a 41-mile pipeline. The shareholders of the CCF could not stop progress of its incorporation.

The Liberals and Conservatives voted 139 to 8 against a CCF motion to "hoist" the bill for six months and then voted 140 to 7 to give it second reading — approval in principle. It now goes to a committee for further study.
