The drop in the number of wards is attributable to a stepped up adoption programme and emphasis on preventive social work. One of the side effects of this drop, however, is that the proportion of teen age wards in our care is rising.

The Board agreed that an active search for foster homes for teen agers must be instituted. After some discussion of the cost of feeding rapidly growing children, it was decided to raise the board rate for teen-agers from \$1.03 to \$1.50 a day.




