Dr. Alan Betts of Cambridge University has stated that if you want a completely disease-free herd of pigs it is necessary that rats and birds must be kept away from the piggery, which in itself is no small task. Clothes must be changed before going in to the building and special precautions have to be taken in the hand ling of all feeding stuffs. All of this adds up to a considerable amount of extra effort but eventually it may

on the part of the veterinarians and in no way interferes with the average herd owner. In fact if no suspicious or positive reactions are encountered the average farmer will never even know when the samples have been taken.

Hog producers will be interested in the establishment of disease-free herds. This is a somewhat new policy that has been discussed in this column before. It has now been announced that the United States has 1000 such herds underway. The rectiony operation to eliminate this source of infection. Licenses have been issued to these herds which will permit this production of 50,000 disease-free pigs per year. It has already been established pigs raised in this way have been raching 200 pounds live weight in 4½ to 5 months with a conversion rate of just under three pounds of feed to one pound of grain.


