**Reporting From the Far East**

 ADVICE FOR TOURISTS WHO VISIT JAPAN

IN THE PAST few years attention in the Western world has been drawn to the Far East and in particular to Japan. In the past years there were feelings of suspicion and in some Western minds they still exist. However it would be a good thing if all of us could travel to Japan and learn to know the Japanese people. I know of one elderly gentleman who said to his son as he left Canada "Be careful son, you just never know what may happen to you in the Orient." And rightly he should be careful but not in the sense his father meant.

Many tourists come to Japan and leave a very bad impression. It is only natural for the Japanese to watch and record the actions of foreigners. One bad Canadian tourist for example can spoil Japan for others. So it is a good policy for us to create a good impression and a lasting impression for the nationals of our own country.

One big fault of the tourist is that he comes to Japan expecting to have the services and comforts of his own country. He will not. If he expects this and does not receive such he will be demanding, loud and very ugly in the eyes of the Japanese. He will tip expecting to receive extra but in Japan people do not want tips for services.

Things are not done quickly here as they are in the West. Life is not so fast and people do things in their own time. What they do is done but you have to learn to wait and be patient.

Another fact which helps the tourist and creates a feeling of goodwill is to be able to speak the language. Naturally this is not always possible but if the tourist tries to learn even a few expressions such as please and thank-you, the Japanese will be delighted with your attempts. To when we think of visiting Japan, the big thing to remember is to be polite.

In brief my advice to a tourist visiting Japan is to be prepared to enter a completely different environment to leave all thoughts of your own country behind, be prepared to adopt to the customs of the country and to be willing to learn and to accept what is different. A truly rewarding adventure among a delightful race of people can't be classed as an ugly Canadian.
