On the Farm  
Front

One of the important factors in the operation of this type of program is the management of the little pigs after they have been removed from their dam. A program of special precautions to protect the piglets against re-infection must be instituted. This is a disease control program with the idea in mind of building a strain of pigs in Ontario that will be free from these costly diseases.

Butter production in Haldimand County during the month of May reversed the trend of the past few months and there was a slight increase of about 13,000 pounds for the month. However, for the five month period ending with May, production was down by 87,423 pounds as compared with last year. On a provincial basis, production for May was up 4.7 per cent and for the five months, it was up 1.5 per cent.

This is the season of the year when every effort should be made to control weeds. It is a well known fact that weeds can and will reduce yields to a much greater extent than is often recognized. For instance a few weeds left in the row by the cultivator can reduce yields of corn by 25 per cent. Just think of it — a quarter of your crop gone because of a few weeds. Weeds such as chloery, curly dock and field bindweed can cut out yields by as much as 25 per cent. Weeds are greedy feeders and are wasteful of both soil, moisture and plant food.

It has been pointed out that it takes 800 to 900 pounds of water to produce one pound of dry weight of lamb's quarters and ragweed. In a similar manner weeds use about 50 per cent more nitrogen and phosphate than grain crops. Some have figured out that the plant food to produce 1000 pounds of lamb's quarters would be sufficient to produce 24 bushels of oats, 19 bushels of barley, 12 bushels of wheat or 16
