THE WEEK AT OTTAWA
The brief also expressed concern over the "restrictive practices of trade unions on the entry on apprentices" and noticed a shortage of nurses which, it said, might be eased by federal financial help in the training of nurses.
The association said the government should consider revising unemployment insurance legislation, making it necessary for industries with a record of seasonal unemployment to pay higher contributions.
The brief had one major complaint — the 10-per-cent tariff on imported printed material such as cook books and school manuals published on contract by American firms for women's organizations and universities in Canada.
The tariff should be raised, the brief said, to protect Canadian printing firms from price undercutting by American firms with more resources and wider available markets.
