**WEST HALDIMAND DISTRICT W.I. OFFICERS' CONFERENCE HELD AT GARNET CHURCH**

**Sports Highlights**

**JARVIS CHEVIES WIN FIRST TWO GAMES AGAINST OLD RIVALS FOR O.R.H.A. CHAMPIONSHIP**  
 The Jarvis Chevies defeated the Ayr Rockets by a 6-2 score last Monday night in the Port Dover Arena to take a 1-0 lead in the best of seven series for the O.R.H.A. Intermediate "A" Championship.  
 The Chevies jumped into a 3-0 lead in the first period on two goals by Bill Nixon and a single by Lorne Hubber. In the middle frame the Chevies added 3 more goals by Bill Nixon and Lorne Hubber. John Meyer put Ayr on the score sheet with a lone goal in the second period. In the final frame each team scored singles, Blaine Hazlett for the Chevies and Doug Parsons for Ayr. Chevie goalie, Dick Arnett, was the best player on the ice as he played one of the best games we have seen him play.  
 The Chevies received 9 penalties to 8 for Ayr.  
 The second game of this series was played in Ayr last night (Wednesday). The third game is scheduled for the Port Dover Arena on Friday night, April 6th with the fourth game in Ayr on Monday, April 9th. On Wednesday night at Ayr the Chevies outplayed their rivals for the championship in a close game with a six to four victory. Full details of this game were not available at press time.  
 The West Haldimand Hospital Board has given careful consideration to the result of the recent financial campaign and the decision has been made to proceed with construction on the basis of a 55-bed structure which was the original plan. While the financial campaign was considerably above the objective originally set it had meant that the result had not been as favorable. In other words, if the minimum objective only had been met it would have been necessary to curtail the preliminary plans as drawn by the architect. The support given, however, enabled the Board to approve certain features that, while not absolutely necessary, are fundamental in a good hospital. The Board therefore, decided to incorporate these features. In so doing every penny of the cash and pledged contributions to the hospital fund will be required.  
 The Chairman of the Board, A. L. Miller, visited the Hospital Services Commission last week to place the views of the Board before the Commission and he reported that the Commission is in full agreement with the decision of the Board.  
 With this approval the architects, Shore & Moffatt, have been instructed to proceed as quickly as possible in finalizing the preliminary plans for a 55-bed hospital in keeping with the requirements of the Hospital Commission.  
 When the preliminary plans have been approved the architect will proceed with working drawings. When these are approved tenders will be called. It is confidently expected that construction will be under way before the year end.
