Suggests Hospital Reforms

Echoes of Laine's and Rusty's vigorous and effective drumbeating on behalf of West Haldimand's much-needed though rather related hospital, has reached these Pacific shores. The fact they are boosting an institution to be located in rural Hagersville proves again that the Recovery is not parochial, except possibly where Port Dover is involved.

As an exile from Nanticoke who has spent at least four years in as many different hospitals we rather timidly, knowing how tender those who are, venture to suggest a few reforms wherein your new hospital may serve as an example to all such institutions and incidentally save time, labour and money.

For instance, why, in the name of all that's soapy, should nurses' aides, maids and even nurses, all of them old enough to know better (bet they don't do it at home) waste so much time and energy making, unmaking and remaking beds? Time after time we've seen it happen that when a patient is obviously known to be about to leave and actually has his going-out suit on again, they remake his bed with fresh linen at the usual time, which is understandable. But once his back is turned in they rush in and tear the bed apart on fresh sheets, etc., throwing the unused linen in the laundry and then the doctor that smirking air of self-satisfaction which implies they may have stuck the laundry that does the hospital washing.

Even aside from the obvious absurdity of washing clean, unused linen, it has long been our contention that more clothes are worn out in tube, domestic and otherwise, than in the hospital. But we've never yet been able to convince any woman of that self-evident truth. The purpose of these T.V. soap commercials, which rarely mention such a plebian thing as the washing machine, is to hobbling down a corridor, ever get dirty enough despite those daily baths, to warrant such extravagance?

These are just the regarding how your new hospital can save money and save both patients and staff. Unneeded activity and annoyance.

We'd always imagined that hospitals were for patients. But now we are beginning to doubt it. Else why compress the day's meals within a nine-hour period; those beds that should come equipped with sleep-inducers that readily restorable, but too rarely by some maverick aide, nurse or doctor. Of course, the additional nurses and even the doctors have a union. I suggest we patients and ex-patients should organize.

A hospital is naturally the best place to be if one is sufficiently ill to be hospitalized and not notice the regimentation.

Incidentally, it's not entirely a non sequitur, how many babies, if any, are born in their mother's home these days? I recall a "How Do You Feel" driving through seven miles of Walpole lake, horse and buggy, of course, to treat a patient. His charge—two (just two) dollars. The present-day deliriously happy father spends more than that for cigars to celebrate the event, as if he'd suffered any pain except in the pocketbook.
