**ON THE FARM FRONT**  
 Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

Dutch Elm Disease is hitting the headlines again and a great many people are very much concerned about the whole matter. The biggest problem seems to be to know what to do. It has been fairly well demonstrated that once the tree has contracted the disease there is little or nothing that can be done by way of spraying. In any case, the only real way of dealing with the disease is to remove the tree from one tree to another. And then, spraying one of the tall trees in itself.

There is one thing that can be done to assist in controlling Dutch Elm Disease and that is to practice good sanitation. By this is meant the cutting down and destroying any branches that have died as a result of the disease and trimming out any trees that are showing symptoms such as wilting and signs of dying. It is not enough to simply cut the tree down or cut out the limbs. Care must be taken to remove any material anywhere near live and healthy trees. The beetles use this type of material as a place to tunnel and then find their way to healthy trees taking the disease with them.

Much has been written and said about the use of zinc in the treatment of the elm disease itself. No one seems to have the final and complete answer. There are some who are convinced that the use of zinc nails (zinc-coated or galvanized) will help to counteract the disease and there are others just as sure that treatment has no merits. When a tree has already contracted the disease and good sanitation practices have been followed in removing all diseased parts there really is nothing to be done in using the nails. If they do some good themselves, or in combination with the trimming, it is all to the good. At least, the experiment does not cost very much.

Have you a good sample of hay? Be sure to save it for entering in the Hay Classes at the Royal Winter Fair. The Prize List for the Fair will soon be out and if you want a copy contact your Ag. Rep. There has always been a feature of room for more entries in these classes and it would be rather nice to have Haldimand win the competition or at least come near the top. Entries in the silage and hay classes need not be of the current year. Ask about this.

The consumption of butter in Canada went up by 33.1 per cent during the month of May showing an increase of 8.6 million pounds as compared with the corresponding month in 1961. On a per capita basis it amounted to 1.79 pounds as compared with 1.34 pounds in May of 1961. It is stated the increase is due mainly to an increased use of butter in the manufacture of ice cream due to the reduction in price. In any case the trend is in the right direction and if it can be maintained it will assist in lending stability to the whole dairy industry.

By now hog producers will be aware that all auction sales are under quarantine as far as hogs are concerned and that no hogs will be shown at any of the fairs and exhibitions held during the month of September but if the situation worsens the ban will be extended. Hog Producers should be ever on the alert for any signs of the disease. The symptoms were covered in this column last week. Be sure to report any suspicious cases of illness in swine to your local veterinarian or to Dr. C. L. L.
