THIS WEEK - -

The largest search ever conducted in Ontario was called off in the night when no finding any trace of 10-year-old Thomas Baker, abducted a week earlier from her parents' farm near Beeton, Ont.

Some 2,000 men had joined in the search last week and after several days of unsuccessful effort by smaller search parties in the area 50 miles north Toronto.

A Provincial Police spokesman however said the police investigation has been intensified.

When the force was told to disperse on Sunday night, it included 700 men from nearby Camp Borden, seven light planes, a helicopter, men from the Ontario lands and forests department and farmer volunteers.

"Public co-operation" said a police spokesman has been wonderful.

More than 1,700 square miles were covered by men and dogs during the week. About 700 square miles of this were covered on foot, and at least 100 miles in shoulder-to-shoulder searching.

Tracking dogs brought into the search included the missing girl's scent beside the swimming hole which she had left, but they lost track of her in the woods where she apparently got into a car," said Ron Sealey, a Beeton businessman and former Canadian Army major who was chief coordinator of the search.

About 250 troops came from Camp Borden. The army set up a field kitchen and the soldiers camped near their trucks. Civilian volunteers were boarded in homes and hotels. Local women produced tons of sandwiches, much of the food donated by local business houses. Five communications networks were set up by the Emergency Measures Organization and private groups.

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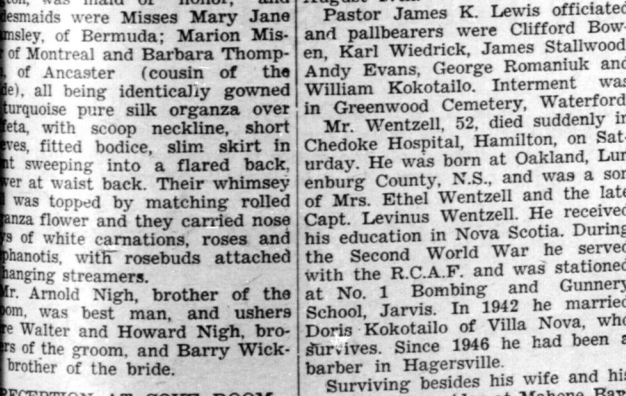
