REGULAR MEETING

(intended for a previous issue)

Jarvis, August 3, 1962. The Municipal Council of the Township of Walpole met on this date with all members present. Reeve Edward Montague presiding. The minutes of the July meeting were read and correspondence given due attention.

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ON THE FARM FRONT
Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

It has been reported that more cattle are on feed in the United States now than there were a year ago and that the increase amounts to about four per cent. This includes a 36 per cent increase in cattle weighing 500 lbs. and under. There is also a 26 per cent increase in cattle weighing 500 to 700 lbs. However, there has been a 23 per cent decrease in the number of cattle weighing over 1100 lbs. This should not affect Canadian beef producers to any extent and certainly not immediately. As of July 1st of this year, Canada had 27.5 per cent less beef in storage than she had a year ago. Furthermore, the total meat stocks in storage this year are down by 17 per cent.

A few figures are now beginning to trickle out of the Census taken in 1961. One of the facts that has caught light verifies information which is that while the farm population across Canada is dwindling, the number of non-farm residents living in rural areas has been increasing. The census taken last year shows that about 30 per cent of the total population live in rural districts. Of this, the non-farm residential population is increasing. Actually there were 3.5 million rural non-farm dwellers or about 29 per cent of the total population of Canada. On the other hand, there were only 2.1 million farmers making up 11 per cent of the total population. In other words, close to 70 per cent of our people now live in non-farm urban areas which is an increase of three per cent as compared with 1956, when the last census was taken.

Buyers of stocker cattle will be interested to know that the dates for these sales in Ontario have now been set. The first of them will be at South River on Friday, September 28th, at 2 P.M. The second will be at the next Wednesday, September 26th. The Little Current Sale will take place on the next day, Thursday, September 27th. There are two other dates to be announced.

Federation Facts

Biggest news at present in farm organization circles is the proposed new milk and cream marketing plan set. The provincial milk marketing board representing the four main milk producing areas in Ontario, the Ontario Milk Producers' Federation, has spent a great many hours preparing this plan. To quote Emerson Parry, vice chairman of the provincial board: "Those of us who have studied the problems of milk marketing feel that this plan holds great promise for Ontario producers. We are confident that it will benefit all dairy producers in the province by stabilizing prices and developing markets. We also feel that this plan can reduce surpluses of dairy products which demoralize our industry, and it will go a long way in relieving the Federal treasury of some of its costly disposal programs."

Before very long a copy of this proposed plan will be in the hands of every milk and cream producer in the province. Producers should study the plan and talk it over among themselves before they go to vote this fall. The provincial board is not saying that this plan will be a cure-all for all the problems of the milk industry, but it will be an important step in the stabilization of one of Canada's foremost industries.
