INFANT DIES, PARENTS INJURED IN DOUBLE HIGHWAY FATALITY

Ronald Michael Bartlett, seven-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Bartlett, of Jarvis, was fatally injured on Sunday night when the car in which he was riding with his parents, crashed head-on with another car just east of Simcoe.

The driver of the other car, Raymond Earl White, R.R. 3, Simcoe, died in the wreck of his auto.

The parents of the dead infant were rushed to the Norfolk General Hospital where they were treated by Dr. John Jenkins. Mrs. Bartlett suffered multiple bruises, cuts and shock and a fracture of the right arm. She was badly cut about the face and nearly one hundred stitches were required to close the wounds. He also had his leg broken at the knee. He was taken to Chedoke Hospital in Hamilton the following day for further treatment to his injuries.

The Bartletts had been visiting with Mrs. Bartlett's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Cooke at Simcoe, earlier in the evening and were on their way home when the accident happened. Snow was falling and the Highway was snow covered at the time.

The accident was investigated by O.P.P. Constable Bruce Church, assisted by Cpl. Ray Kowal.

Funeral service for the Bartlett baby was held from the Senn & McKenzie Funeral Home, Hagersville on Wednesday afternoon with interment in Wesley United Church Cemetery, Jarvis.
