

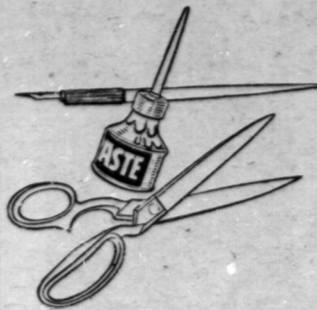

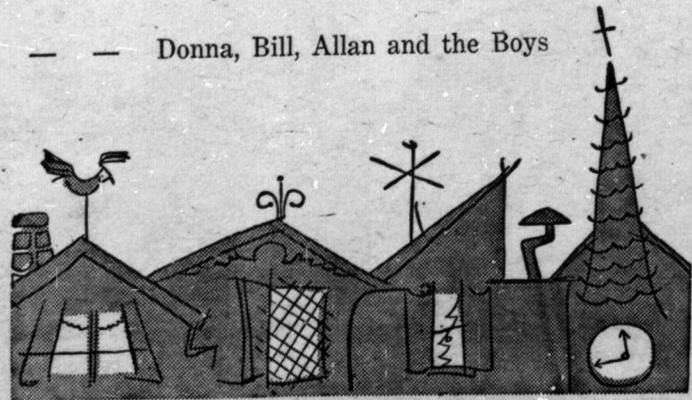

CRIMINOLOGY SCHOOL
A six-man study group has urged Ontario to set up its own post-graduate school of criminology. The group told a conference on criminology and delinquency in Montreal Saturday that such an institution could engage in essential research as well as turn out trained personnel and potential teachers in a field that needs them. The group's report said the criminology institute should be established independently at a university where faculties of law, medicine, psychology, social work and sociology already are established.

THIS WEEK -

(Intended for a previous issue)
Some 50,000 to 75,000 persons lined the two-mile route to watch the Grey Cup parade in downtown Toronto Saturday. There was little "cup fever" evident as the bands, marchers, balloon-bearers and floats officially kicked off the 1962 edition of the Grey Cup.
At that stage there was only one patch of fog to bother the spectators but it was a mute warning of what was to follow.
During the afternoon thick fog swept over Toronto and other areas along the shores of Lake Ontario and Lake Erie, bringing a halt to the game of the year in the fourth quarter and chaos to traffic.
The fog acted as a blanket to a number of crimes and traffic accidents in Ontario and caused delays to shipping at both ends of the Welland Canal.
Flights into Toronto airport had to be rerouted to London, Ont., which also handled a number of outgoing flights. Many passengers were unable to make their journeys.
The fog persisted Sunday but held off long enough to allow completion of the football classic at the Canadian National Exhibition stadium.
Fifteen persons died on the province's highways during the west end and fog was blamed for some of them. Ontario had the highest number of accidental deaths throughout the country.

PROVINCIAL POLLS
Some towns in Ontario went to the polls Saturday to choose new administrators for the next two years. But most elections were held December 3 with issues ranging from fluoridation of water supplies to Sunday movies.
Voters in Welland approved fluoridation and Sunday movies and sports while Bracebridge rejected Sunday sports and movies.

STRIKE SETTLED
Settlement of a 17-week strike by members of Local 939, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers was announced Sunday. The dispute affected an estimated \$20,000,000 worth of industrial, public and private projects.
Joseph Egan, spokesman for six major electrical contractors announced the settlement with David T. Butt, local business agent. Mr. Egan said some electricians will not be organized in work for "a little while".
About 90 of the local's 140 members were indirectly involved in the dispute.

MILK PROBLEMS
President Emerson Farnsworth of the Ontario Whole Milk League said Saturday many problems facing the industry would be solved if producers agreed to do their own advertising.
He was addressing the annual meeting of the Chatham Milk Producers Association which approved formation of a committee to study the possibility of producers paying for their products' advertising on a production basis.

Mr. Farnsworth criticized statements blaming Ontario for Canada's present milk product surplus. "We cannot control interprovincial trade; we are all in this together," he said. He called for a single marketing plan and one marketing board. This was the best means of alleviating the problem despite rejection of the proposal by milk boards in the province which wished to operate individually, he said.
