On words of encouragement from James W. McBurney, President of the Farm Machinery Act in Ontario, we must be the best possible means of informing Government officials of this support.

It is interesting to note that we shall be able to support our farm groups if we are to be successful in obtaining the necessary legislation to improve the position of the farmer in his farm machinery.

Farmers can assist considerably by the following points to the writer of this column:

1. Actual cases where farmers have had difficulties in obtaining repair parts for farm machinery.
2. Any instances where farm equipment has failed to meet the requirements of the manufacturer.
3. Cases where distributors have withdrawn from the market after selling equipment.
4. Instances where in the opinion of the purchaser the price of the machine or parts was excessive.
5. Instances where distributors have failed to keep up their guarantee on equipment.
6. Instances where there has been a delay in getting a machine repaired.
7. What is the attitude of equipment manufacturers toward a Farm Machinery Act?

PROGRESS OF LIONISM CITED BY DIST. GOV.

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SOUTHERN ONTARIO LIBERALS

HOLD CONVENTION AT SIMCOE

ONTARIO LEADER JOHN WINTERMEYER AND HON. JOHN PICKERSGILL, M.P., PRINCIPAL SPEAKERS AT SATURDAY'S SESSIONS

CONVENTION HELD AT NORFOLK HOTEL

Highly educated for all the people of Ontario, and a definite plan for economic progress, will be the platform of his party in future campaigns, says Ontario Liberal leader John Wintermeier.

Addressing the annual convention of the Southern Ontario Liberal Association at Simcoe last Saturday night he declared:

"We will take as our objective the maximum development of each human being's ability, intellectually, spiritually and physically. Then we will build a group of young people who can fight for their country in the field of ideas. This will be our clarion call, our goal."

Mr. Wintermeier said co-operation must be effective between management and labor in order that economic progress can be achieved. He charged that Ontario has not moved effectively, and in fact has drifted, through lack of an economic plan.

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ATTACKS LIBERALS

Ontario Mines Minister George Wardrop at Barrie attacked leaders and advisers of the federal Liberal Party as prophets of doom pursuing their own narrow interests.

"I have no time for men like Lester Pearson, Paul Martin and Walter Gordon who are always talking about how bad things are in this country," Mr. Wardrop said at the meeting of the Central Ontario Young Progressive Conservative Association.

He urged delegates to ignore "these doom and gloom people" and carry the Conservative message to the electorate. He charged that even Mr. Frost left office with a broken back and that the government has cost the \$100,000,000 tax rebate from Ottawa.

In referring to a press note stating that he (Mr. Pickersgill) had misrepresented the Prime Minister to the election, Mr. Wardrop said he was willing to retract as Mr. Diefenbaker had done so many times.

However he still held that he was paid to be Prime Minister not to lecture on the merits of the Conservative Party.

The appointment is for six years, and Mr. Justice Wilson has been granted leave of absence from the Ontario court.

The native of Schomberg, Ont., who graduated from Osgoode Hall and was called to the bar in 1922, is known as an outstanding man. In November he was reprimanded by the Law Society of Upper Canada. Mr. Justice Wilson is a divorcee. In 1959 Mr. Justice Wilson was appointed to the Ontario bench. He has a wife and three children. He is a recognized and a speaker.

Under the constitution of Cyprus, which became an independent republic in 1960 after 82 years of British rule, the High Court president must come from a neutral country, not from Cyprus, Greece, Turkey or Britain.

POST IN CYPRUS

Mr. Justice John Leonard Wilson, 62, a member of the Ontario Supreme Court since 1945, has been appointed president of the High Court of Cyprus and will leave with his wife on March 5 to take his post on the Mediterranean island.

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
