Clark, O.P.A. Engineer. Any sign of wear or cracks means you are headed for trouble and the remedy is to replace the cap immediately. Cracks will permit moisture to enter and this will kill your spark. Arcing will result where excessive wearing takes place and this makes for corrosion and high resistance. The net result of all this will likely be hard starting and poor gas economy.  
How many times do you say, "There ought to be a law?" when actually there is one, that we don't know about. For instance, when a slowpoke driver on the highway, delays you, because you can't pass — there actually is a law, that can lose the offending driver two points under the demerit system for unnecessary slow driving. This is a law devised for the safety of all highway users, and it is being enforced.
