

Real "Cold" Weather In California

San Franciscoans are finding the weather a brisk conversation piece; in fact so are most all Californians. Normally, one hesitates to call it winter, so crisp and benign are these California Januarys.

San Francisco's "cold" snap got down to 33° which is within six degrees of the all-time record here. That was in December 1922, when the mercury "sank" away down to 27° above zero. Official records go back 90 years. This cold snap brought "traces" of snow but nothing like that "big blizzard" of 1857 which blanketed the city with 24 inches. The worst of that snowstorm was that the weather came off cold afterward so that the snow hung on for hours and hours. In fact it wasn't until the afternoon of the second day that the cable car tracks didn't look like toboggan slides.

Now that the arctic air fallout has dissolved and the weather is coming up out of its glass sheeter, a good many Californians are hoping that all this talk about Los Angeles, in particular, giving folks in Florida such a bad time is daily reports on California's rising population.

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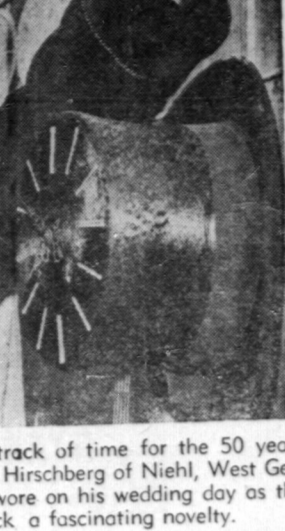
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Non-Stop Suitcases PRINTED PATTERN

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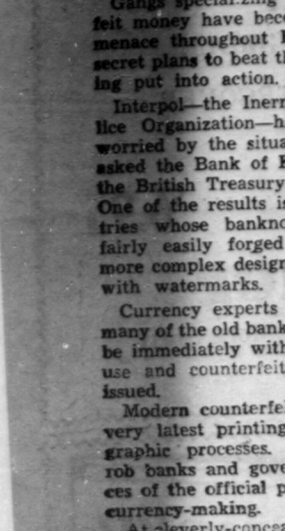
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
