

Still Find Holes In West German Wall

In the five months since Wal-Ulbricht's wall sealed off East Berlin, the flood of 4,000 refugees a day has dwindled to trickle. But the trickle is peristent, and Ulbricht's People's olice have been unable to stem t. Some East Germans have cut the wire; some have climbed it: me have jumped over it; still more have rammed through it in all kinds of vehicles from armored cranes to commandeered railroad trains.

Last month the refugees found night in Frohnau, a suburb in the rench sector, a startled West German border guard was conronted by a grimy East German spoke. "I've come from ove here," said the refugee. "There are more. Is the way clear? The West Berlin guard survey d the barbed wire a few yard

"All clear," he said. man police stood by while 27 nore refugees squirmed up from the end of a 90-foot tunnel whose entrance began in the basement of a small cottage a few yards away from the barbed wire, in which had been dug in two weeks by two families working in shifts, went down to a depth of 6 feet and was only 2 feet high. The oldest refugee was a semiparalyzed woman of 71; the youngest, a child of 8 While the East Berliners were

digging their way to freedom, another group of refugees were holiday-bound aboard the good ship Fritz Heckert, on a cruise of East Africa. At Casablanca, ten of the ship's 350 passengers slipped away and sought sanctuary in the West German Consulate Next day, Brigitte Tschirner, 27, a draftswoman, and her fiance, Hans Busse, 42, a DEFA film director, were among the fourteen more who defected in Rabat. "When the bus stopped," said Brigitte, "I said I was going across the street to buy oranges. Hans moved slowly away, pre-tending to take pictures." Soon the Rabat crowds swallowed
