1962 TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES ISSUED

(Intended for last issue) Marking a new year in telephone progress, the 1962 telephone directory is now on its way to homes and offices in Jarvis, D. A. McArthur, Bell Telephone manager for this district, said this week.

For Jarvis, Simcoe, Port Dover and Waterford customers, Direct Distance Dialing will go into effect May 8. Starting that day, telephone users in these exchanges will be able to dial their own station-to-station long distance calls. Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) calls are contained in the new directory.

Also on May 8, dialing instructions will come into effect. DDD calls will be made by dialing the number of the exchange and the number of the station. The new directory lists the numbers in the new format.

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News of the Countryside

Federation Facts

(Intended for a previous issue) The principal farmer-owned, co-operative processing plants received unanimous approval by members of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture meeting in Toronto recently. Several co-operative processing enterprises in meat, fowl and milk are members of the federation either as individuals or through the United Co-operatives of Ontario and vegetable growers are currently considering entering the processing field through a co-operative.

This resolution grew out of a discussion of Farmers' Allied Meat Enterprises Co-operative which is developing a meat processing operation. Members were divided concerning giving outright endorsement to BAMB or individual member organizations but were completely in favour of all efforts by farmers to enter the processing field by co-operative action.

A comprehensive report of the Ontario Stock Yards was given by general manager, Fred M. Campbell. While the terminal market at Toronto is the only such stockyards in North America owned by a government, its purpose is the same as to establish a neutral ground where buyers and sellers of livestock can do business. It is a place where producers are able to convert livestock into currency at the highest value established at that particular time. The Stock Yards Board representing livestock producers is responsible for licensing all agents operating at the market - commission firms, order buyers and dealers.

Mr. Campbell stressed the value of a strong competitive market at Toronto to producers all over Ontario and, indeed, across Canada. Auction selling at the yards had evened out supplies of livestock through the week and thus increased the bargaining strength of the producer and his representatives. Over \$100 million dollars worth of livestock are sold at the yards annually at a cost to the producer of about 1 to 1 1/2% of sales.

The Ontario Stock Yards have experimented with a system of direct, instantaneous communication of offerings and sales at other major livestock markets in Canada as an additional service. Special feeder sales on week ends are being encouraged so producers may have a greater choice in buying their requirements. Mr. Campbell also reported that increasing numbers of cattle were going back to the country for more finishing thus raising the overall quality of the slaughter cattle available and dealers.

The OFA members passed resolutions requesting further exemptions from the provincial sales tax for equipment essential to farmers; supporting efforts to require amber lighting to be shown on farm equipment on highways at night; requesting government action to establish a program for the control of mastitis; asking that the Food and Drug Act be strengthened to prevent the sale of unfit meat; for compensation for livestock owners a-

The need to obtain a bed in hospital is a matter of urgency to a seriously ill person. It is vital, therefore, that every hospital bed in Ontario be used only when it is essential in the treatment of a patient. Proper use of hospital beds is a matter of concern to every resident of the province.

To help make more hospital beds available... the Commission now will provide Ontario Hospital Insurance benefits to an insured person who receives hospital care, as an out-patient, for which he or she, otherwise, would require admission as an in-patient to stay in hospital overnight.

IMPORTANT

These benefits will be provided only if the hospital has the required facilities and after these facilities have been authorized for such out-patient use by the local hospital board on the advice of its medical staff.

Here are the details:

- It is up to the patient's doctor to decide whether the treatment will be given on an in-patient or out-patient basis.
- Visits to established regular clinics in hospital out-patient departments are NOT covered.

Extension of EMERGENCY Out-Patient Benefits

Effective March 1, 1962, when an insured person has received emergency hospital treatment for a fracture within 24 hours of an accident, Ontario Hospital Insurance also will cover subsequent out-patient services for check X-rays and the change or removal of cast, until treatment of the fracture is completed.

Hospital treatment for emergency conditions other than fractures will NOT be covered beyond the first visit to hospital within 24 hours of an accident.

POINTS TO REMEMBER

- Ontario Hospital Insurance in-patient benefits cover the regular and usual hospital services (use of operating room, X-rays, drugs, laboratory services, etc.) in standard ward accommodation for as many days as such services are medically necessary.
- Dependent children cease to be covered under the parent's certificate when they reach age 19, or marry. They must then register separately at the applicable Single or Family premium. Application forms are available at all hospitals, most banks, and all Commission offices.
- Married persons must pay the Family premium.
- There is no change in Ontario Hospital Insurance premiums; they remain at \$2.10 a month for a single person and \$4.20 a month for a family. More than 6,000,000 Ontario residents (over 95% of the people) are now insured in the plan.

Ontario Hospital Insurance does NOT cover...

- any hospital charges
- any diagnostic services which are not part of insured treatment procedures or which do not, by themselves, normally require admission as an in-patient.
- any medical, surgical, or private-duty nursing fees, take-home drugs, home care, or ambulance and other transportation charges.
