A.C. this kind of feed has about the same amount of dry matter per cubic foot as other grass silages. It goes through less fermentation than ordinary silages and has no distinct flavour of its own. This is really not a new type of preservation of hay crops. Reports are on file showing its use fifty years or more ago. Evidently the important factor in the handling of this type of material is to exclude all air oxygen). This is the trouble-maker and the drier the raw material the more difficult it is to obtain this esult. Where air does get in, heating, moulding and mildewing sets in with considerable loss of dry matter and palatability. It might be well to give this subject rather careful thought before attempting to store any part of your crop in this way.
