

ily supply enough eggs for domestic needs and have plenty for export as well". He also pointed out that latest reports from the Canada Department of Aggriculture showed the production of Frozen eggs in Canada until April 7, 1962 to be 6,987,454 lbs., near ly twice the figure for the previous year when the output was 3,838,264 lbs. to that date.

"Ontario Egg Producers are hard enough pressed by other factors" said Mr. Robson, "without having to contend with the threat of cheap imports of Polish eggs. In 1951 according to the Censes there were some 78,000 egg producers in Ontario. In 1959 there were only 37,800 producers to register for the Federal Government's deficiency payment program, and recent indications are that we would be lucky to be able to find 20,000 egg producers in Ontario".

"This is just one more good reason why Ontario egg producers should join together in the organization of one marketing plan for eggs" said Mr. Robson. "The drastic reduction in the number of producers in Ontario, and the regular recurrence of such threats to the egg price structure in Ontario points again to the need for such organized action". "Ontario producers have a reputation for a high quality product and we intend to press strongly for action that will give the consumer complete assurance that she will receive nothing but this high quality in her purchases of eggs and poultry products", said the President of the Ontario Egg Producers Association.
