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## GRADUATES

The —  
Christian Viewpoint

GRADUATION DAY

For many of our young people, the  
past few days and weeks have been  
both anxious and exciting, as with  
bated breath they have awaited the  
results of examinations, that climax  
several years of work at University  
or College. At last the time has  
come and graduation ceremonies  
mark the beginning of a new ven-  
ture. The next question is "What  
shall I do? How shall I use that  
which I have acquired?"

A University Professor speaking to  
the graduating class, reminded them  
that their success was marked not by  
their graduation, but by what they  
would do with the learning skills and  
tools they had acquired. These ben-  
efits of higher learning may be used  
for selfish ends or for the benefit  
of mankind. For security, personal  
possessions our individual advancement  
over ourselves or as a contribu-  
tion to the world in which we live.

Engineers may build new roads,  
Roists that open up the backwood  
territories of mankind, to the ben-  
efits of modern science and learning.  
Devise better housing for under-  
privileged peoples. Teachers may de-  
vote their lives to educating those  
who cannot read or write or know  
little of the world outside their na-  
tive Village. Doctors and nurses may  
choose to follow in the footsteps of  
men like Schweitzer and Dooley, or  
Florence Nightingale.

We cannot all be missionaries in  
the literal sense of the word, but we  
can all have a mission. Ouri can be  
a vocation through which the high-  
est spiritual qualities and moral  
values may be exercised for the good  
of mankind. We can give an honest  
day's work for a day's pay; be time-  
keepers without being timekeepers,  
afraid lest we cannot leave our work  
at the stroke of the clock. We, as  
invest ourselves, our gifts and in-  
most natures, without always assess-  
ing the returns in terms of personal  
gain and prestige, that such invest-  
ments may bring.

"Freely you have received, freely  
give" was the admonition of Jesus  
to His followers, for we all are de-  
bters one to another. Without the self-  
giving of our forebears, the sacrifice  
they made, the struggles they en-  
dured, there would be no graduation  
you or for your children, no freedom  
to enjoy, no service to perform.

At a well attended gathering of  
the Brant-Haldimand — "Democ-  
rats in Dunnville on Saturday, Allan  
C. Good of Brantford and Toronto,  
a high school teacher with a farming  
background, received the nomination  
to contest the constituency in the  
forthcoming election. Mr. Good was  
nominated by Brantford public school  
teacher Gord Kaufman and was un-  
opposed.

Mr. Good is the brother  
of the New Democratic Party candi-  
date for the Brantford riding, Bob  
Good, and is the son of W. C. Good,  
a former member of parliament for  
the Progressives in 1921.

In his acceptance speech, Mr. Good  
likened the economy to a pie and said  
his main interest was "how to  
make the pie larger and distribute it  
more equally."

Mr. Good, 49, is married and the  
father of 4 children. He has an M.A.  
in the fine arts from the University  
of Toronto and is presently on leave  
from his teaching duties at East  
York Collegiate while doing research  
under a Canada Council grant.

He was born and raised on a farm  
in Brant County where he also farmed  
for seven years. He still has  
farm interests, being president of  
two farm corporations.

A veteran of 2 years with the  
Royal Canadian Air Force, Mr. Good  
has also worked as a re-  
porter with the Toronto Daily Star  
and the Star Weekly. Mr. Good is  
also a professional mural and por-  
trait artist and has spent six sum-  
mers designing displays and painting  
murals for the Canadian National  
Exhibition.

A member of the Ontario Second-  
ary School Teachers Federation, Mr.  
Good has taught school in Quebec  
and Scotland and has travelled ex-  
tensively in Europe with his family.
