"OFF THE TOP OF YOUR HEAD"

expression — "Off The Top Of
Your Head" is quite a familiar one.
no reference, of course, to a
statement by the "Lord
Admiral". Rather it is an ex-
pression used to indicate "first im-
pressions".

As a rather technical term, it may
be frequently used by various
people who wish to discover a per-
son's reaction to a given set of
circumstances. In this regard it can
be a very useful method of uncover-
ing the nature or personality of a
person.

As a general habit however, saying
"Off the top of your head" is not
to be recommended. It is a
statement which is often made
without having carefully and intelli-
gently carried on at a deep level. In
many cases, when we say what first
comes into our minds, at a later time
we have to retract or at least cover
up our thoughtless words.

Paul has a wise word for his friends
at Colosse, "Let your speech al-
ways be with grace, seasoned with
salt." (Col. 4, 6). Grace is the
quality that enables us to see our-
selves as sinful men in need of God's
mercy. It makes us conscious that
our own thoughts and deeds are not
beyond reproach. Moreover grace,
"seasoned with salt", is a preserving
quality, rather than a destructive
one. "But let your communication be
Yes, yes; Nay, nay; for whatever is
more than these cometh from evil". (Matt. 5: 37).

what was to be their Master's final
meal with them.
