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COUNTY AGREE ON FEDERAL OFFER RE DUNNVILLE BRIDGE

Over a period of several years there has been a continuing effort in the East end of Haldimand County to complete a satisfactory arrangement at all levels of Government whereby the bridge over the lower end of Grand River and which leads into the Town of Dunnville, could be re-built to provide better traffic accommodation.

Last week the Federal Government offered the County \$420,000 to take over all Federal works associated with the Grand River Dam at Dunnville. The present bridge runs over the Dam, built in 1829 in order to maintain water levels in the central portion of the first Welland Canal. The Federal offer calls for the County to assume all responsibility for the bridge and dam and the length of the dammed Welland Feeder Canal located within the limits of Haldimand County.

Reeve Sid Crook of Balaam Town ship, who is also Chairman of the Bridge Committee on the Haldimand County Council, announced the Federal offer a few days ago. After receiving the offer the committee met at Cayuga to consider the matter. The result of the meeting produced the following resolution which has been forwarded to the President of the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority under whose jurisdiction the responsibility for the bridge now rests.

"Moved by Reeve William T. Oster, seconded by Reeve Cecil Johnson: That we vote the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority to accept their offer of \$420,000 toward the cost of building a new bridge and \$20,000 for the annual lands lying within Haldimand County. Such acceptance is conditional on the Federal Government granting the County of Haldimand all the lands and works lying within the County without any terms or conditions attached thereto."

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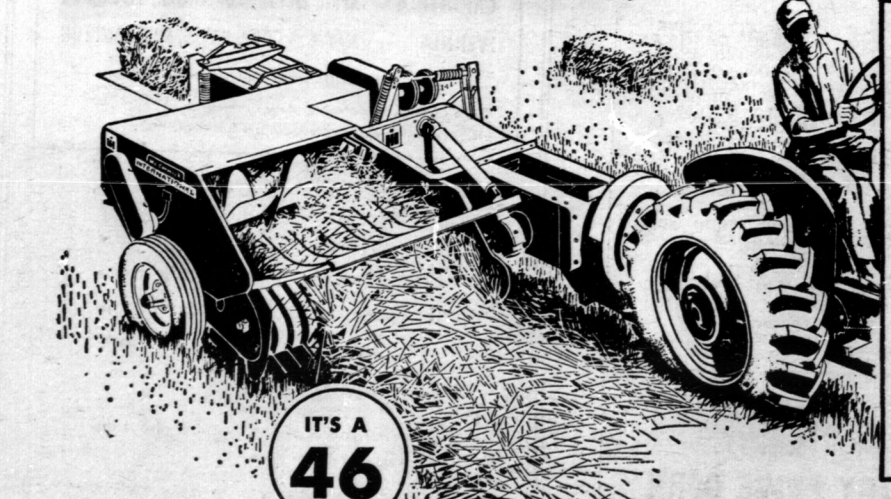
