The steers were classified in this category last year but six years earlier, only 57 per cent were classified as such.

4-11 Steers entered in this competition must gain 2 lbs. per day, but of the 1388 steers sold in the past 7 years, the average daily gain has been 2.25 lbs. per day for the month feeding period prior to the show.

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The Hamilton District Cattle Breeders' Association has elected directors from Norfolk and Haldimand Counties. Max Bowyer will represent Norfolk Breeders on the discipline for another year while Arthur Bradford of Dunville, Norma Gowling of Canfield, Harold Nie of Selkirk and Bill Snowden of Nanticoke will represent Haldimand for a 2 year term. The volume of business in 1962 was greater than the previous year, with services available for six dairy breeds, six beef breeds, as well as goats.

During the recent Haldimand County meeting, Dr. King, veterinarian at the H.D.C.B.A. pointed out that major causes of infertility in cattle herds is improper or negligent management. Dr. King stressed that good reproductive performance demands constant attention, accurate records, adequate knowledge of proper management practices and intelligent use of competent veterinary service to keep failure of reproduction to a minimum.

Holstein breeders of Haldimand who travelled by bus to the Guelph district last week, had the opportunity to see some of the outstanding herds in that area.

At the Charles Fox farm, one of the many outstanding cows in the herd was one descended from a cow purchased from Isaac High in Cayuga in 1915. The present cow, 16 years of age, has produced over 215,000 lbs. of milk in 11 lactations, with the best record being 22,500 lbs. of milk, as well as producing 14,200 lbs. of milk as a 2 year old.

The Holstein herd at the Ontario Reformatory, Guelph, is one of the largest herds in Central Ontario. With 90 cows milking, they were producing close to two and a half tons of milk per day. The famous "Jenny" cow was in the stable (O.T.G. Jenny Bag Apple Patch). This cow has produced over 250,000 lbs. of milk in her lifetime. 28,000 lbs. of milk in one year is her highest record and she has 6 or 7 high producing daughters in the herd. Any Holstein breeders visiting the Guelph district are encouraged to visit this famous herd, located just east of Guelph on High way No. 7.

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Effective April 1st, 1963, the quality premium on Grade A hog carcasses will be increased from \$2.00 to \$2.50, the Federal Minister of Agriculture has announced. 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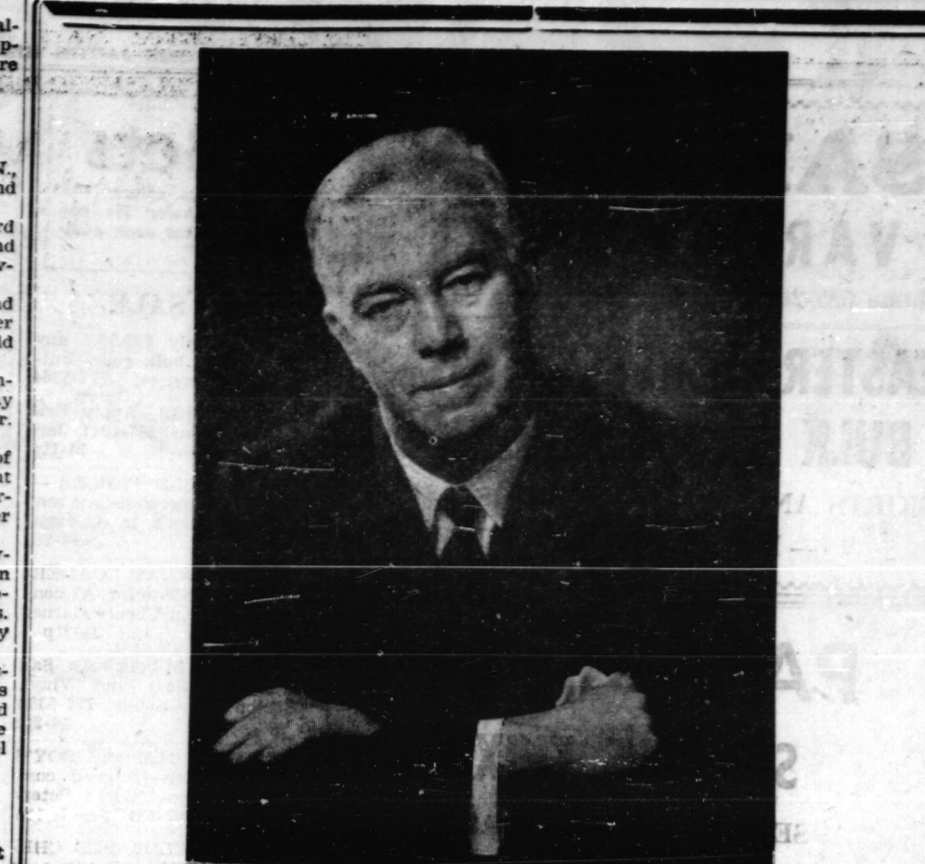
