Federation Facts

For many years members of the meat packing industry of Canada have gone to great effort to point out to the people the small amount of profit they make in handling the farmers' products. Figures quoted invariably are based on per dollar sales. This usually runs at about one per cent of profit out of every dollar of products sold.
The picture, however, is very much different when profits are considered in relation to capital invested.
The recent issue of the Bank of Commerce Commercial Letter shows that in 1960 Canada's slaughtering and meat packing industry realized a profit of only 1.2 per cent of its sales. This was about the lowest for any industry in Canada. The average for all industries was 4.5 per cent.
But in terms of percent return on invested capital, the meat packing industry placed well up on the list of Canadian manufacturers with an average return of 10.5 per cent. This compares with a national average for all manufacturing industries of 5.2 per cent and a return of 7.8 per cent for the Canadian industry.
In view of the bank's summary, net profit figures, quoted by packing companies in terms of total volume of business done, do not appear to be a very good indication of profitability of the industry. While we are not suggesting that farmers rush into the packing business, we think they have reason to regard the figures, so often quoted, with a degree of skepticism.
