SELL MORE WHEAT

The Canadian wheat board announced a new wheat sale to commence on August 22, 1965, inside one month. The new contract called for 3,700,000 bushels of winter wheat covered in July 1965. The board said that the terms are 10 per cent cash on shipment with the balance plus interest paid within three years. The order will be shipped from St. Lawrence and Pacific ports between now and November.

The board's whole export picture was bright. The bureau of statistics announced that exports of wheat in the first half of 1965 reached a record of \$130,000,000, an increase of \$190,000,000 from the previous peak attained last year.

The bank of Canada increased its lending rate to four per cent from 3 1/2 per cent in line with a sharp rise in Canadian foreign exchange reserves in July.

Although the central bank rate usually signals repercussions throughout the commercial money market, last week's change was described as a technical adjustment without effect on monetary policy.
