PARENTS HOPE TO RESOLVE TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS

The group of taxpayers who are seeking improved transportation facilities for their children in the North Walpole School Area, decided on Thursday night to make another appeal to the School Board at the regular meeting on Thursday, Feb. 7th, with the hope of resolving the problem.

The group had previously decided to take their children off the bus presently operating, that is transporting the children to other areas, and send them to their own school section last Monday morning, in protest against the current arrangement implemented by the Board.

The decision to defer this action came as a result of a letter received on Feb. 7th, (today), Mr. Chairman which pointed out that the meeting of the Board was scheduled on Feb. 7th, and any persons were privileged to attend "This was taken as an invitation by the parents to meet with the Board in an effort to negotiate a plan that might be acceptable to both sides."

The move to defer the boycott action from Monday morning until after the Board meeting on Thursday was instigated by Kenneth Bousfield who said "I believe the members of the Board are reasonable men and surely we can appeal to their sense of decency and fair play in solving this problem."

Support for this view was general throughout the meeting but it was equally evident that positive action would be taken immediately should efforts to resolve the matter fail.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Charles Graham and was attended by Mr. Charles Graham to act as spokesman for the parents at the Board meeting on Feb. 7th, (today), Mr. Graham stated that he felt the approach to the Board should be in a sense of sincere negotiation and responsibility.

Mr. Emerson Phillips was chairman of the meeting and Mrs. Graham acted as secretary. The meeting was held at 8:30 P.M.

PRESENTS BUDGET

THE HON. JAMES N. ALLAN

Haldimand-Norfolk M.L.A. and Provincial Treasurer, is presenting his fifth Budget to the Legislature of Ontario today.

Financial relief to local school boards and municipalities highlighted the budget address today, Thursday, February 7th, by the Honourable James N. Allan, Provincial Treasurer and member for Haldimand-Norfolk. It was Mr. Allan's fifth budget and forecast expenditures of more than a billion dollars in the next two months.

School boards and municipalities will receive immediate financial relief. By adding \$20 million to this year's operating budget, the government will be able to make advance payments to school boards this month and thereby reduce or alleviate the financial burden of borrowing money at the local level. Previously, grants to school boards were made only in April and October. Now, based on the previous year's net grant, advance payments will be made to school boards in February, April, August and October.

The Ontario government also intends to move forward its advance payments to school boards operating schools where non-resident pupils exceed 10 per cent of total school enrolment now as it was last June. It could very well end up in another February at a similar amount to the case, those who are disappointed in the knowledge another vote is being taken at this time, will be fully justified in their views.
