ON THE FARM FRONT Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer AGRICULTURE, CAYUGA "Farm Management and Accounting" is a detailed and complex part of the farm operation. In 1952, farmers in Ontario sent 1,064 completed account books to the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for summary and analysis. The farm cooperators group a record of the complete year's business in the Ontario Farm Account Book for a calendar year. After December 31st each year, the cooperators add the accounts, take an inventory, and send the completed account books to the Ontario Agricultural College. After checking and adding up the account columns, the official completes the summary and analysis and returns the account books to the cooperators by April 1st each year. A preliminary report showing the results of the type of farm similar to his own, together with the analysis report of his own farm, is sent to each co-operator.
