Weekly newspapers, facing a crucial period of test, due to rising costs, are being revitalized by new business techniques. Bert C. Smith, 1962 president of Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association, said the annual convention at Toronto's Royal York, February 8-9.

Mr. Smith, who publishes the Weekly, Port Credit, said that despite strong opposition of other newspaper publishers, weekly newspapers will not disappear.

"With the application of intelligence and imagination on the part of management, the news weekly is still and will continue to be the medium of our land which is thoroughly engaged in every detail," he said.

Mr. Smith admonished his fellow publishers to watch costs carefully and raise rates accordingly. He drew on his 42 years' experience in newspapers work and handed out a number of "rules" for sound business administration.
